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




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

I thank You for Your supernatural eternal blessings, the anointing of the blessing of Abraham, to walk in the fullness of what You, Jesus, have already paid for us." CECE'S 3 PRAYER DOS

1 ASK FOR DIRECTIONS

"When I'm unsure about which way to go in life, I open my heart and ask God for directions," shares CeCe. "For instance, my husband, Alvin, and I never wanted to start a church, but people were always asking us, 'You guys starting a church yet?'

So after years of this, we prayed, God, if this is what You want, please make it clear, because we don't feel it. Before we knew it, things started to happen and God put Nashville Life Church on our hearts...you can't get any clearer than that!"

PRAISE AWAY ANXIETY

"When life hits me hard or I'm feeling anxious or sad, I begin to praise God so I don't stay down," says CeCe. "The enemy doesn't play fair—and self-pity, stress and anxiety is a tool of the enemy. So when I start to feel those negative

emotions, I say out loud, 'No!' and refuse to let it overtake me. Then I turn to the Lord and love on Him because the Bible says that the garment of praise will lift the spirit of heaviness—it's not always easy but works every time."

8 WIN SOULS

"We do this challenge at church where we try to win as many souls as we can, and now I try to 'win souls' in almost everything I do." says CeCe. "It forces me to focus on others and reminds me that it's actually not about me—it's about God

and sharing His love. For instance, today I was doing a Facebook Live announcement about my album and I prayed, Lord, I need Your supernatural power, this is about You! Just trying to win souls for Him makes everything so exciting!"

HE LOVES AWAY OUR LONELINESS

"'How come you live all alone and are so sad?' my neighbor's 7-year-old son, Leo, asked me. I'd reluctantly agreed to babysit him on a rainy Saturday afternoon and with every new question, I regretted it more and more.

"Since my husband and I had split up and my daughter had gone off to college, my life had derailed. I'd never imagined I'd be alone at my age, but I was. Every morning I wrote in my prayer journal asking for God to help me find a person who would bring me joy again, but nothing ever changed. Why do I have to suffer through this pain?

I'd write to the Lord, Jesus, please help me feel less lonely!

"As my depression had grown darker, my anger had begun to bubble to the surface. Why can't this kid just mind his own business? I thought as Leo peppered me with more questions. 'I guess God just wants me to be alone!' I snorted back, fearing it was true.

"Last year as Easter approached, my usual joy was replaced with a strange emptiness and despair. Desperate to get in the spirit of things, I went to Walmart to search for decorations for our family dinner that Sunday, but my spirit still felt as dull as the eyes of the stuffed bunnies that stared out at me from the store's shelves. Where is my fire for You, Jesus? I prayed. I feel so lost.

"Suddenly a little girl came and sat right in the center of the aisle. She closed her eyes, held her hands together and began to pray. 'Are you lost, honey?' I asked, echoing my own thoughts.

"'Not for long,' she answered, confidently, completely unafraid. 'I said a prayer like my mommy told me. Jesus will find me.'

LOVE NEVER DIES

"I'd been completely lost since my mother passed away from brain cancer late last year. She had been my best friend, my confidant and such a light in my world. My grief ran deep, but my questions went deeper. I wished God had an 800 number where I could call Him directly and ask all the things that tormented my heart. Why couldn't I have had more time with her? Am I a faithful woman if I am angry and question You?

"One afternoon I stopped in at a new thrift store that opened up in town. While hunting through racks of old sweaters, picture frames and teacups, my heart broke, thinking of how much Mom would have loved this place. Suddenly, I spotted a wooden board on a shelf nearby. Someone had hand-painted scrolling lettering across the front and as I read the words, I felt my legs almost buckle beneath me. It said, I love you a bushel and a peck and a hug around your neck. My mom had sung that song to me when I was a little child. Every time I'd gone off to school. Anytime I hadn't felt good. Whenever she'd



wanted to make me laugh. It had even been the last thing she'd ever said to me before she took her last breath. 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In a rare and exclusive interview, bestselling author Wm Paul Young opens up to Simple Grace about the personal experiences that inspired the book that's changed millions of hearts

hen Wm Paul Young's wife asked him to write a book for their six children about his relationship with God, he had no clue that the novel—which was penned in longhand as he commuted to three jobs—would wind up selling more than 20 million copies worldwide and go on to become a blockbuster film. Yet *The Shack* has done just that. "I originally made 15 copies at Office Depot and gave them away as Christmas gifts," laughs Paul,

who goes by his middle name. "I just wanted my kids to know the God that healed my heart." But God had bigger

plans for *The Shack*...and for Paul. Here, he shares how his relationship with God brought him through his painful past to insights that can help *you* grow closer to our Lord.

OUR FATHER IS LOVING

Born in Grande Prairie, Alberta, Canada, Paul spent his childhood in Netherlands New Guinea, where his parents were evangelical missionaries to the Dani, a fierce primitive tribe. As a child, Paul was taught that God the Father was angry, disapproving and distant, which mirrored the way he saw his own father. "Being around my dad was like walking around a minefield, with the explosive devices changing positions every night while I slept," Paul shares. "Because of our theology, I ended up imposing my dad's anger on the Father.

"So as a child, I turned to Jesus to save me from the Father," says Paul, "but what I really needed was for someone to save me from my own dad." >

The Shack comes to the big screen

SHACK

Ten years after the book's release. Through his relationship with Jesus, Paul slowly realized the Father wasn't the wrathful deity he'd grown up with. He was kind, always present and unconditionally loving. "It took me 50 vears to erase the face of my dad from the Father," admits Paul, explaining that this is why in *The* Shack, he portrays Papa (what the characters call the Father) as a gentle black woman. "This imagery upset some people, but it was as far away as I could get from the anger and terror I knew as a child, and closer to the tender Father I now know."

GOD HEALS ALL HURTS

In addition to a tumultuous relationship with his dad, Paul also


experienced sexual abuse as a child—first in the tribal culture, then while attending boarding school. "One of the graces I've been given is that I never attributed the hurt that human beings inflicted on me as originating in God," Paul shares. "There is evil in this world and people make their own choices. But God was there to pick up my pieces. He climbed inside me and spoke to my heart and that took me in the direction of being in an amazing relationship with Him."

The only way to move forward in the midst of great sadness, Paul learned, is to encounter great love. "God's love is always present, and oh, it is great!" he exclaims. "Some things are

still not healed in me, but I constantly feel His embrace."

GOD IS THREE TIMES THE JOY

Over the years, as Paul's relationship with God became richer and deeper, he developed unique bonds with Jesus, the Father and the Holy Spirit. "I believe there is only one God," states Paul, "and I never feel



like I'm only praying to Jesus as opposed to the Father or the Holy Spirit, but there is a sense that I'm talking *first* to one of the three." Paul illustrates this in *The Shack*, by portraying the Father (Papa), Jesus and the Holy Spirit as individual characters, each with a unique personality.

When praying to the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, Paul often asks, What do I need to be praying? What are You trying to do here? "I've discovered that prayer isn't usually about me at all," shares Paul. "It's about my participation in the world in one form or another. I get a nudge or an idea and I'll say, 'Tell me what is this about. Can I participate?' If you just stay present to one day at a time, you begin to interact

with what's going on right in front of you, and then God's nudge turns into action!"

SPIRIT BRINGS US TRUTH

As a self-described "question asker and seeker of knowledge," Paul likes to call on the Holy Spirit in particular for inspiration and answers. "The Holy Spirit teaches us stuff we can't find in books, and I want more people to be able to hear what the Holy Spirit is saying to them because it's always going to be something good!" Paul enthuses.

"The Spirit guides us, answers questions and gives us a better sense of who we are so we can break free from a sense of unworthiness and encounter the character of God in new ways."

Paul addresses The Shack's big controversy

Since the book's release, there has been one scene that has incited heated debates and criticism, in which the main character, Mackenzie, asks Jesus, "Do all roads lead to You?" Jesus replies, "Not at all. Most roads don't lead anywhere. What it does mean is that I will travel any road to find you." Some argue that this implies Paul is suggesting that there are other ways to the Father apart from Jesus. Paul clarifies: "In the Early Church, they didn't think the gospel was that you can receive Jesus into your life; they thought the gospel was that Jesus had received you into His life, into His anointing with the Holy Spirit, into His relationship with the Father," Paul explains. "So, yes, salvation is in Jesus. We've been included in Him. We've been created in Him. It's about knowing the truth, and the truth is a person."

OVERCOMING

➤ GOD IS ESPECIALLY FOND OF US

Today Paul wears a lot of hats as a pastor, author, husband, father and grandfather, but he says his true identity comes from God loving him for who he is. "True love recognizes us for who we are, not the good things we've done, not the bad things we've done," he says. "That's how I love my nine grandchildren—e.

my nine grandchildren—each one is a special individual—that's how God loves us."

To illustrate this in *The Shack*, Papa often says, *I am especially fond of...* a given person. "There's a world of difference in saying 'I love you,' which is about me, and saying 'I am especially fond of you,' which is about you," Paul says. "The latter addresses a disquiet in our souls that cries, *God, I know You love me, but do You know* me and do You like me? Is there anything about me that's worth loving?"


During a visit to a women's prison, Paul saw firsthand the power of knowing God sees us each as special. "Most of the women were there because they'd suffered betrayals—I can relate, we all have some sort of prison



in our lives," he says. "One woman came up to me in tears and asked, 'Do you think Papa is fond of me?' I replied honestly, 'Papa is *especially* fond of you!'

She looked into my eyes and said, 'That's all I need to know.' I thought, Oh dear, that's all any of us needs to know! It's taken me most of my life, but I now know that God loves me, is especially fond of me, is for me...and He always will be."

One year after the death of his beloved wife, Joey, singer-songwriter Rory Feek opens his heart to *Simple Grace* about how God carried him through grief and taught him that love never leaves us

o you think God is going to heal me?" Joey Feek asked quietly as she looked into her husband Rory's sad eyes. He didn't want to answer such a question...but he knew he had to. Rory couldn't lie to his wife after all she'd been through—the painful treatments, the tears, the prayers. "No, honey," he replied. "I don't think He is."

"I didn't think so," Joey sighed, and smiled the sweetest smile. "That's okay," she added, "I got to experience everything I wanted to. I'm ready now."

Today, a little more than a year later, Rory looks back on

that conversation in awe. Of Joey's strength. Of her unshakable faith. "Joey never stopped believing that [healing] was possible, and she believed it right up until then," Rory shares in his new book, *This Life I Live: One Man's Extraordinary*, *Ordinary Life and the Woman Who Changed it Forever*.

Rory also watched Joey's love for God grow stronger until the day they said their worldly goodbye on March 4, 2016.

"You can't watch the woman you love go through what Joey went through and not be changed," he tells *Simple Grace*. "Changed by her. Changed by God. Changed by her faith and how she lived it out to the end of the line. Joey helped me fully realize the potential of my character...and my walk with God."

Here, Rory shares how Joey renewed his heart, how God got him through losing the love of his life and how he is finding his way back to joy.

GOD HEARS OUR PRAYERS

When Rory met Indiana native Joey Martin at a songwriters' night in Nashville in 2002, he

was instantly smitten with the beautiful aspiring singer in the dusty cowboy boots. At the time, Rory was a divorced father raising two daugh-

ters, Heidi and Hopie, and he had seen his share of heartache. For years he'd longed for a deep, lasting love, but every relationship had ended in disappointment. Finally, he'd put all his hopes for love in God's hands. "Whatever it is that we refuse to give to God," Rory muses, "is probably the one thing He wants from us."

Joey Feek: "Jesus never leaves us"



In a 2014 interview, five months before her cancer had returned, Joey gave us a glimpse of her sweet relationship with the

Lord...and it was this love for Him. that had sustained her through the days to come: "The biggest thing for me is that [God's] always here." Joey said. "He's always waiting on us to come back to Him. When we got home the night after we had my [cervical cancer] diagnosis, He kept coming to me and every hour I'd pray, I need You, Oh bless me now, my Savior! Jesus comes when we're at our lowest, at the bottom of the barrel, and reminds us that He's never going to leave us or forsake us, whether it be here on Earth...or up in Heaven."

Rory got on his knees. "I humbled myself and emptied myself into God. And then I stood up and tried not to be the same man I'd been for the past 35 years," he shares. "When you die to yourself, it's then that you truly live." And soon after meeting Joey, Rory began to see that every heartbreak, every lonely night, every dashed dream, had just been bricks in the road that had lead him straight to her.

GOD IS OUR FOUNDATION

After a whirlwind courtship, Rory and Joey were married on June 15, 2002, just two months after they met. For their wedding, they chose a single verse to live and love by: As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord (Joshua 24:15). "It was printed on the napkins for our wedding reception and even deeper in our hearts as we started our marriage," Rory shares. "We took it to mean: 'It's not about what I want; it's about what *He* wants.' When people looked at our relationship and saw Joey serving me and me serving her, what they'd really be seeing was us serving Him."

With a solid foundation of faith, Rory and Joey embarked on an incredible journey. The

couple began singing and writing songs together, and in 2008 they won third place on CMT's talent competition, Can You Duet, which led to record deals, national tours and their own television show that highlighted life on their Tennessee farm.

But it was their love for Iesus and their harmony on and off the stage

that made them one of country music's most beloved duos. "Joey and I rarely ever raised our voices at each other," Rory recalls. "We talked. We reasoned. And we cried. But what we did most was pray. Sometimes we prayed together. We held hands and lifted our problems up to someone bigger and smarter than us. Sometimes we prayed on our own. I still do."

Rory notes most of his private prayer time doesn't really look like praying at all. "It looks more like driving or working or making dinner," he says with a laugh. "But inside I'm trying to be prayerful, to communicate with God and ask Him for guidance. I often pray for wisdom

and patience. I try to think about God and what He wants. I just try to get the focus off of myself and onto where it's supposed to be—on Him."

GOD TEACHES US LESSONS IN LOVE

On February 17, 2014, Rory and Joey welcomed a precious baby girl and named her Indiana. "Indy was diagnosed with Down syndrome, but all we could see was how incredibly beautiful she was and how lucky we were," describes Rory. "God had already written a great story of our life, but with Indiana, He gave us an *incredible* story of love that we never could've imagined for ourselves." >

Three months after Indy's birth, their story took another unexpected turn when Joey was diagnosed with cervical cancer. She had a hysterectomy and was declared cancer-free. But a year later in June of 2015, the cancer returned and metastasized in her colon. After many painful surgeries, radiation and chemotherapy treatments, it continued to aggressively spread.

In October of 2015, they stopped treatment and returned to their farmhouse to focus on the time they had left together. "We came home. Not to die.



By November of 2015, Joey was often too weak to walk, so instead, Rory took her into his arms and they danced

But to live," Rory explained on his blog, ThisLifeILive.com. "To put our hands in each other's and sit out on the back porch and watch the sun set as our sweet little baby girl plays on a blanket in front of us. To bask in the glory of the beautiful life He's blessed us with, and try not to question why we can't have more of it together."

During the next few months, Rory and Joey also looked for God's lessons in the heartache. "He gave me Joey and Indiana for a reason," Rory says. "Joey was the light in my darkness. I have a feeling that Indiana is here to teach me everything. She's going to teach me what unconditional love is. Not the version that I want it to be. I'm still trying to remember that this life isn't about me, no matter how many times the man in the mirror tells me it is "

GOD HAS A BIGGER PLAN

During her final weeks, Rory says that Joey's faith never wavered. "Faith went from being important to Joey to being the only thing. I saw it happen," Rory recalls. "When all you have is your family and time, you don't want to do a bucket list or anything else—you

decide what's most important and everything else goes away." Rory says he'll never forget how Joey always kept her Bible in her lap those last days. "She was so focused on God," he adds. "Not on herself or on her illness. That was just amazing to see." On March 4, 2016, as the family held hands and prayed around her bedside, Joey, only 40 years old, went home to Jesus.

Today, a little more than a year after Joey's passing, Rory doesn't have any regrets, but he admits he would have done a few things differently. "[I'd] cherish every moment of every day more," he admits. "I'd love Joey more and serve her more and do a million gazillion things to show her more how much she means to me. No matter how much of that I did, it still wasn't enough. She always deserved more."

Putting his heart in God's hands again has been his shelter from the grief. "It's not always easy, but trust in Him changes everything," Rory states. "It overcomes emotions like fear and hopelessness. There's something powerful about believing He has a bigger plan for us all."

Rory also finds joy in knowing that every precious moment he and Joey had together was

an awesome gift—and that love never leaves us. "I've been sustained by the love I've been given," Rory says. "Love that I know I don't deserve. And I am sustained by God's gift of having time, precious time, to be together, to love our baby, to say goodbye a hundred times. And kiss goodbye a thousand."

Herb-Crusted Crown Roast of Lamb

ACTIVE TIME: 15 min. TOTAL TIME: 1 hr. SERVES: 6

- 2 cups fresh bread crumbs or panko crumbs
- 1/2 cup mixed fresh herbs, like parsley, thyme, and rosemary
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tsp. lemon zest
- 3 Tbs. olive oil, plus more for brushing lamb
- 1 (4 lb.) crown roast of lamb, prepared by butcher
- 1 Heat oven to 425°F. In processor, pulse together crumbs, herbs, garlic, lemon zest and olive oil to combine. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- 2 Place lamb on sheet pan. Brush inside and outside of roast with oil; season generously with salt and pepper. Gently press crumbs onto flesh side of lamb to coat. Wrap bone ends with foil to prevent burning.
- 3 Roast 25 to 30 min. or until thermometer reads 130°F for medium-rare. Place on platter. Let rest 15 min. before carving. Garnish with lemon slices, thyme and artichokes, if desired.

- 2 Pour mixture into blender. Blend 30 sec.; let cool 2 min. With machine running, drizzle in butter; blend until thick. Season.
- 3 In saucepot, boil asparagus in enough water to cover 4 min.; drain. Top asparagus with sauce.

 - 2 Tbs. chopped chives
- 1 In saucepot over high heat, bring potatoes, parsnips and enough salted water to cover to a boil. Cook 10 min. more or until vegetables are fork-tender; drain well.
- 2 Transfer potato mixture to large bowl. Using hand masher, mash potatoes and parsnips with chicken broth, cream cheese and chives. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
- 3 Garnish with additional chives and bacon bits, if desired.

Whether you're using them to brighten up your home or giving them as loving Easter gifts, these easy-to-make eggshell nosegays serve as a wonderful reminder of how we are all renewed by the sacrifice Jesus made for us

Supplies

Poster putty

Eggs
Teaspoon
Craft-store floral foam
A handful of seasonal flowers
A handful of floral filler
Pink paint pen



Step 1: To create each egg bouquet, start by using the edge of a teaspoon to crack and remove the top quarter of the egg's shell. Then empty out the yolk and rinse the shell well.

Step 2: Cut a small piece of floral foam to fit inside the shell. Soak the foam in water and place it in the bottom of the shell. Snip a trio of seasonal blooms and a small handful of floral filler (like baby's breath) to about 3 or 4 inches. Carefully insert stems into the floral foam.

Step 3: Pick up a bright-pink paint pen (from the craft store) and use it to write a verse about Easter, like Matthew 28:6, on the front of the shell. Let dry. To finish, gently press a piece of poster putty onto the base of the egg bouquet, then press it onto a tabletop to display.

Poster putty




Step 1: Start by placing the round sheet of moss on the terracotta saucer. Then lay the terra-cotta pot on its side in the center of the moss, creating the "tomb." Drape the other sheets of moss over the pot and anchor on either side with two or three rocks.


Step 2: Lean the biggest river rock against the pot's opening (as shown). Continue to sprinkle a few rocks around the garden.

Step 3: To make each cross, crisscross two wooden sticks and affix them in the center by knotting a length of twine. Press crosses into the moss, behind the tomb, using poster putty.

Blueberry-Lemon Sweet Rolls

ACTIVE TIME: 30 min. TOTAL TIME: 2 hrs. SERVES: 16

- 3/4 cup, plus 2 tsp. milk, divided
- 1/2 **cup butter,** at room temp. and divided
- 3 cups unbleached flour
- 1 (1/4 oz.) **pkg. rapid-rise yeast,** like Fleischmann's
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar, divided
 - 1 lemon, zested and juiced
- 2 large eggs
- 1½ cups fresh blueberries
 - 1/4 cup blueberry preserves
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 In microwave-safe bowl, heat ³/₄ cup milk and ¹/₄ cup butter 90 sec. or until 130°F. Using stand mixer fitted with paddle attachment on low speed, mix flour, yeast, ½ cup granulated sugar, 1 Tbs. lemon zest and ½ tsp. salt 15 sec. Beat in heated milk mixture 30 sec. or until moistened. With mixer on medium speed, beat in eggs. Beat 3 min. or until dough is smooth and glossy; shape into a ball. Place in greased bowl. Cover with plastic wrap. Let rest in 15 min. or until dough has settled.



- 2 In bowl, toss blueberries with preserves to coat. On floured work surface, roll out dough to 12" x 18" rectangle. Brush dough with remaining butter; sprinkle with remaining granulated sugar and dollop with blueberry mixture. Starting at long end, roll dough into a log; pinch seam to seal. Cut into 16 equal slices. Arrange slices in 2 greased 8" baking pans. Cover lightly with towel. Let rise 1 hr. or until dough has doubled in size.
- 3 Heat oven to 350°F. Bake rolls 30 min. or until golden and center of dough is 190°F. Meanwhile, in bowl, whisk together powdered sugar, 2 tsp. milk and 1½ tsp. lemon juice to form glaze, adding additional milk or lemon juice to thin as needed. Drizzle glaze over warm rolls. Serve warm or at room temp.



I mean, anything less formal feels disrespectful! What is the secret to feeling freer to talk from my heart and connect with You more personally?"

We understand and yet...

We don't want to be disrespectful in prayer. When we talk to You, traditional practices feel appropriately reverent. But then we don't feel the closeness that others report having. What's the best way to get close to You?

ear child, it's understandable that when you're in your mind and you imagine the majesty of your Father and the purity of Myself, you become tongue-tied and rely on words you've memorized. The secret to overcoming your fear is to move out of your mind and into your heart.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment."

—Jesus to the Pharisee lawyer, Matthew 22:37–38

Can you try something for Me? First, think about all I've done for you. Do you feel overwhelmed to the point of fear? Yes, that's a natural response. Now with your thinking mind relaxed, let your heart flow with love toward Me. Feels good, yes? Much easier. You don't need to think through how you are small and I am large. You don't need to feel guilty because I sacrificed for you in a way that you cannot sacrifice for Me. No...you just simply need to let your love flow and accept My love in return. No need to overthink it.

Try imagining your heart as the church and rote prayers as the scaffolding. These words can help keep your heart in the right place and help heal it. The words are a way for your mind to help out your heart. But these words are not the *source* of our connection: your heart is. Your connection with Me is heart-to-heart through love ferried by the Holy Spirit. The more you love Me, the closer we will become. So easy...so beautiful.

frantically, then in desperation, go to your computer and activate the "find my phone" feature. Suddenly you feel a vibration right by your side. You're overcome with relief and joy—*Ah! It was here all along!*

The connection between the Bible and Me is not so different. I, the Word, live hidden in your heart just like the phone was hidden in your pocket. When you read the word in the Bible, you activate the Word in your heart just like your computer activates your phone. You feel the same wondrous relief (*Ah! It was here all along!*), only it's much more powerful (*God was with me all along!*)

The Biblical word is your homing device to find the Word (Me) in your heart. The thrill you see in others when they read the Bible isn't so much about the text as it is that as they read or recite it, they realize with overwhelming fullness that I am always in their hearts.

To feel this wonderful resonance, all you need to do is reach out to Me more frequently in quiet, loving prayer so My presence grows stronger in your heart, spirit and mind.

ear child, your question is a very good one and opens up an excellent topic for reflection: Why should you be kind to others?

When you are unkind only when you cannot be seen, it suggests that your

answer to that question is "so others are kind to me in return." But that is not your best answer.

The best answer is that you are kind to others so that you may live more fully in Me and "For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same?"

—Jesus to the crowd Matthew 5:46

draw closer to your Father. It matters not the response you get from others.

It may help to imagine your Father's kingdom as a place where the state of your heart dictates where your spirit travels. When your heart is tender, open and loving—no matter whether you can be seen by others or not—your spirit moves into the company of other hearts that are tender, open and loving and draws closer to the throne where I sit. In other words, you tend to your own heart in order to move to your most joyful place, your Father's kingdom (which is in your midst even though you can't now apprehend it). The way others react is beside the point. It doesn't matter if you're seen by others or if they appreciate your open heart: The more you open your heart, the more joy and peace you'll feel because you'll be closer to Me.

The more you live this teaching, the more loving you will feel toward others even when no one else can see.



"Dear Lord, I'm so worn-out from my husband's constant lies. Whenever we argue, he twists my words and denies things I know are true—statements I've made, lines he's crossed, the reality of our life together. He tries to make me think I'm crazy and is such a master at it that I do sometimes second-guess the facts. It's not even the lies

that bother me as much as the chronic anxiety I feel when he's around. How can I clear his toxicity from my mind?"

It seems those closest to us are the ones capable of hurting us the most. When they act cruelly and use intimate knowledge against us, what can relieve our pain?



ear child, when someone tries to bait you into leaving your truth to enter theirs, take your refuge in Me. By retreating into My truth, you'll protect yourself from their bullying without striking back.

And My truth—unlike yours—is a fortress they can't breach.

Imagine that I am a golden castle that provides you with a guaranteed home base. The more you spend time with Me in quiet, lov"And if the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it, but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you."

> —Jesus to His disciples, Matthew 10:13

ing, aware prayer, the more comfortable you feel in this home—and the easier it is to return when you feel threatened by others or even by your own fear.

The next time your loved one tries to draw you out into an argument, send up a prayer like, *Jesus*, *please take me home*, and feel yourself surrounded by My peace. Your loved one may continue to talk, but you will feel miles away and safe in My arms. You will also be able to send out love in the hopes that this will encourage your loved one to stop his or her game playing.

When a loved one is provoking you and is not appeased by your sending out love, you may need to make a bigger change. To receive guidance regarding this, spend time in quiet, loving prayer with Me to give the Holy Spirit an opportunity to fully infuse your spirit with your Father's truth. Just five minutes of mind quiet can bring you startling clarity about what lines to draw when.







"Dear Lord, I apparently offended a friend by giving her a religious card with Bible verses for her wedding, and now I'm trying to hold back this resentment that an action I consider beautiful could be seen as 'crossing the line' in this couple's eyes. She hasn't accepted You as her Savior, and so I fear for her soul. I love her and I'm frightened that she won't be saved. Is it so wrong to reach out like this? Everything is so politically correct now and it just ruins the experience of living my faith. Even my usual friendly 'I'll pray for you' has started to taste bitter in my mouth. I feel that as a Christian I have a right to let my love of the word and of You show, without feeling insecure and worrying what other people think. Aren't I right to push back against this bigotry?"

Wisdom of the Word

Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.

—Paul in a letter to the Colossians, 3:11

We understand and yet...

We don't intend to offend others when we show our love for You, so their rejection hurts. Our acts of kindness are inspired by You and the messages of Scripture. Even if they aren't received well, aren't these faithful gestures a force for good in an increasingly materialistic world?



ear child, I thank you for the love and honor you show Me, and doing so in private is always an uncomplicated good. But when it comes to sharing your faith with your neighbor, things can get trickier.

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another."

—Jesus to His disciples, John 13:34

You must weigh your every action against this new commandment. I'll overdo it to show you what I mean: If your neighbor is Muslim, you must ask yourself if giving her something like the Bible on a special occasion is truly a kindness. Would you like to receive a copy of the Koran at a baby shower? Or would it feel as though your friend was being aggressive and stepping out of line? This consideration of how you would feel if the same type of thing was done to you is always your best guide.

Often you tell yourself that you're doing something for a higher purpose when you're actually gaining some satisfaction from being "right." Since this is a natural human impulse, the only way around it is to hold your sense of what's right very loosely and lightly. You may think you know the reality of an aspect of life; but because of your limited ability to apprehend your Father's ways and means, you may have gotten it wrong. That is why you must avoid judging others. There is no shame in your limitations.

Remember: I did not command you to be right. I command you to love. And that you can always do.





The art of radical humility

"Dear Lord, looking at the palm cross hanging in my living room and reflecting on the humble way You took Your triumphant journey to Jerusalem, I'm distracted by this mounting frustration with a certain group of leaders in my church community. They like to brag and show off their wealth and power in totally inappropriate ways, in such contrast to Your modesty. I know I should be preparing my heart for this important week of Your passion, death and resurrection, but instead I'm dwelling on these off-putting displays—fancy cars parked in front of the church, expensive jewelry and outright bragging. Just today I overheard one man boast that he 'saved' our church by having a stained-glass chapel installed to the tune of tens of thousands of dollars. I don't want to leave my church, but the contrast between their boasting and your humility is troubling. Please guide me!"

Wisdom of the Word

Therefore you have no excuse, everyone of you who passes judgment, for in that which you judge another, you condemn yourself; for you who judge practice the same things.

—Paul in a letter to the Romans, 2:1 NASB

We understand and yet...

Witnessing other people's failings triggers frustration and doubt in man's essential goodness. We want to wipe the anger from our hearts but it keeps churning when we see how far their actions fall from the mark. How do we stop ruminating on the ways others fall short?

ear child, the heart of compassion and the soul of humility is seeing your own weakness in that of another. What you are describing are people who are making themselves feel as though they're superior to others by using worldly wealth as a yardstick. When you get caught up in judging them, you are doing the same thing—making yourself feel superior—but using a different yardstick (your "goodness").

"Would that you, even you, had known on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes."

—Jesus, weeping, to Jerusalem and His disciples, Luke 19:42

The way out of this cycle of judgment is to see your own weakness in the other: The braggart's vanity over his fat wallet is the same feeling as your vanity over your good and proper action. You also give into the temptation to feel superior. Find it in your heart to forgive the braggart and you will automatically forgive yourself. Vanity is part of being human: Your goal is to recognize and release it. You cannot avoid it. No one can.

The secret to peace is the humility that you are not superior to any other. The secret to peace is the humility that you are all in the same boat. It is hard to go this low, I know, but it is the only way to rise. Come to Me now in loving prayer so I might give you the strength to surrender your superiority. Close your eyes, send your love to Me as though on a beam of light and allow the true light I send back to you take away your sense of being better.

"Dear Lord, I read about You forgiving other people's sins, but I get no sense of relief because I feel like what I've done falls outside the scope of 'forgivable.' If you've committed a grievous act, it's you who I preferentially seek. I very badly want to bring you home from where you've wandered. Forgiveness is always yours. Always and already.

Imagine a concentrated drop of black ink. It seems so dense, so concentrated, so unyielding to change. Now see yourself allowing the ink drop to fall into a glass of water. The black becomes lighter. Now see it fall into a filled bathtub. It loosens up so you can't scarce a trace of it. Now see it fall into the largest ocean. It disappears.

When you surrender to Me in prayer, you are engulfed by a purity so vast that your stain disappears and you are left spotless no matter how black the spot. Let's try it now: Close your eyes, clasp your hands and bring to mind the crime that is making you self-hating. Send Me a wave of love. Feel the Holy Spirit bring you My love in return and surrender to that feeling. In that surrendering, release your crime. Let it go. Let it go. Feel My love sweep it away into My vastness. And just like that...it's gone.

See him swagger and wave his gun at any lions or monkeys who approach him, confident that he is well able to protect himself. Imagine him scorning the safety of his cozy bedroom for the thrill of the "hunt." Very misguided? Yes.

"The kingdom of God is not coming in ways that can be observed, nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There!' for behold, the kingdom of God is in the midst of you."

—Jesus to the Pharisees, Luke 17:20-21

This is how I see you when you wander away from your Father's will for your life and "take on the world." Full of your own bluster, you think you know best how to keep yourself safe. The trouble is, just as the boy in My story doesn't have the sense to apprehend the danger around him, you don't have the *senses* to apprehend the truth. What your eyes see and what your ears hear is not all there is. You must walk by faith not by sight.

You are moving through your Father's kingdom right now—your heart guides your journey, love is your means of locomotion. You must listen with your heart to the guidance of your Father: That is the only way to stay safe.

Do you have five minutes to listen right now? If so, come to Me in a quiet loving prayer. Rest in Me and allow the Holy Spirit to bring you the truth of your Father's will for you and the courage to carry it out.

ear child, the secret to loving another in a way that elevates both of you is to be found in an open heart. You always want to make sure your love is flowing outward without the obstruction of jealousy or resentment or grasping.

That said, your actions are another matter. When someone you love takes advantage of your generosity in a way that doesn't serve either of you, it's the loving thing to draw the line. In a case where you're always

Now bring to mind and heart your loved one and ask for My help like, *Jesus*, *please search my heart for any grudge I may be holding*. Relax and remain still to allow the Spirit time to clean your spirit and free your heart. Whatever line you draw from this place of purity will be a loving one.

"Dear Lord, I'm thinking of how You hosted the traitor at the Last Supper and I'm addressing You now as a traitor myself, desperate for forgiveness. 

what they are missing. Your heart should weep for them rather than your mind race with condemning thoughts.



Loving Prayer

To honor of our risen Lord this Easter, we are introducing a new way of using our daily devotional. In place of the daily advice to offer love to Jesus in prayer, we are including a place to record what you surrendered in love and gained through grace. Here, we feature a guide to this form of prayer

hen asked by a Pharisee what was the greatest commandment of religious law, Jesus was very clear: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment" (Matthew 22:37). Jesus was building on what Moses said to the Israelites as recorded in the Book of Deuteronomy (13:3): Moses referenced loving with your whole heart and soul; Iesus adds mind to the mix. We at Simple Grace take Jesus at His word and have dedicated ourselves to loving our Lord in a quiet, mindful way daily.

MORE THAN SENTIMENT

When was the last time you felt overwhelmed by love? Maybe it was when you were watching your granddaughter sleep, or in response to a gift of flowers your husband surprised you with. When you think back to that moment, can you remember how strong the power of that love was? Rather than a fleeting thought or even a feeling, that love felt almost as though it had a substance and strength like light or sound or wind.

That kind of powerful love is what Jesus meant in his commandment to us: You send Him your worldly love and He'll respond with His divine love. You send Him your limited feeling and He'll transform it into something infinite and eternal.

As you rest in the golden state that this loving to and fro creates, you give the Holy Spirit an opportunity to cleanse your spirit of all the grudge that builds up in daily life. As Jesus transforms your heart, the Spirit reorders and purifies your spirit.

GETTING STARTED

Find a quiet space where you won't be disturbed for five minutes. Settle into a comfortable sitting position and bring your hands together in prayer or simply clasped. Close your eyes and give your thoughts a minute or two to drift from your mind. See them as so many passing clouds—they're there, but you don't have to think them through. Shake out the tension from your shoulders and anywhere stress has gotten stuck.

From this place of mental and physical stillness, bring to mind an image of Jesus. Feel your heart open and your body relax even further. Imagine that your love is a powerful, permeating substance like light or wind and direct it either inward or outward toward Jesus. You'll feel your spirit lift as the Holy Spirit brings you confirmation of your loving communion.

Now here's the hard part: Rest in His arms, staying still in mind and body for five minutes. (It may help to set a timer so you don't have to worry about when



to finish.) As thoughts arise, allow them to pass by so you can fully receive. Jesus asks us to love not only with our heart and our soul but also with our mind: Surrendering our thoughts, leaving our small self behind, is critical to experience a fuller communion with Him. As you emerge from this prayer, you will feel filled with love, light and sweet peace.

Just five minutes a day can fill your heart with love, leave your spirit newly refreshed and bring you closer in every way to your Lord and Savior.

The secret to big joy

"Dear Lord, I planned a lot of quality time with friends and family this past weekend in honor of Easter, but I found my mind constantly wandering. I would be talking to one friend and then wonder if there was someone better to talk with. I would be at one event and think about wanting to be at another. I ended up sapping all the joy out of my 'happy time' with this restless longing. Can You help?"

ear child, it sounds as though your problem comes from always thinking big: You find yourself comparing big differences (between people, between events) rather than simply savoring the small.

One way to bring yourself into the joy of the moment is to notice something usually beneath notice: the ring on your friend's finger, a certain inflection to her voice, the way the light dances on

We understand and yet...

It's tough to hold back our anger when people are rude.

We want to let them know when they've gone too far without hurting our relationship with them...but how?

ear child, I'm so sorry for your frustration with the rudeness and insensitivity of the younger generation. I know how you feel and had similar irritations when I walked your world.

One way to send a signal to others without alienating them is to simply withdraw your light. As a radiant child of a merciful Father, you radiate light and love and

peace wherever you go. When someone crosses a line, you can simply "go dark" for a moment. Fall silent and turn your light inward. You might also turn away from the one who has offended you to tend to a simple chore or other physical activity. 

Letting go of loved ones rips into our hearts so much that even though we trust it is part of Your bigger plan, we fall into despair. When the enormity of our pain prevents us from feeling You by our side, it's truly more than we can bear. What's the way out of this captivity to pain?

ear child, I am so sorry to hear of the intensity of your pain and even sorrier that it has imprisoned you. But your prison bars are an illusion: In truth, you are free and abiding in Me. Your loved one is likewise abiding in Me. In Me, you and he are still as one. The treasure of your love lives eternally in your Father's kingdom.

"Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me."

To discover for yourself the truth of your situation, you need to find a way to quiet your mind so your heart can hear, so your spirit can see. One way to do this is to physically tire yourself out. into the underlying cause of the tension you're feeling.

The trouble is:

also block Me out. This
can set up a vicious

cycle: When you turn to the worldly comfort, you block out My help and comfort, which in turn causes you to feel more troubled, which in turn drives you back to the worldly comfort. You can see how this cycle could create a serious problem in your life if left unchecked.

When you're feeling so tense or sad or angry that you want to turn to a worldly comfort to blot it out, turn to Me in prayer instead. Rather than covering over the hurt, you'll be releasing it—truly freeing yourself of it and purifying your heart. I love you. Come to Me now.



And I know You also say to forgive, but I don't think You have any idea what that would take from me."

We understand and yet...

Some crimes against us are so terrible that we hold on to anger as if it were a lifeline. Others tell us that forgiveness is freedom, but it can feel as though letting go of hatred is just a loss on top of loss. When things go this far, how do we make our peace?

ear child, I am so sorry for the pain and hurt you've had to go through. I send out My heart to you. But I disagree with your analysis of your situation: Although horrible things were done to you, you do not need to carry one ounce of ugliness throughout your life. When someone violates you, they dirty themselves, they carry the ugliness. You are left pure.

Then Peter came and said to Him, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me and I forgive him? Up to seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you, up to seven times, but up to seventy times seven." —Matthew 18:21–22 NASB

However, you do sully yourself with your own anger. You are harboring two kinds of "dirt" in your heart: the mistaken notion that you are made ugly by another's ugly actions and your hatred for your attacker. Search inside yourself and find the way that you condemn yourself for your attack. Once you find it, release it to Me in prayer. Let the Holy Spirit sweep it away. With your self-condemnation gone, you'll find that forgiving the one who hurt comes easier. Let Me help. We can do this together.



When those closest to us are not on the same page spiritually, it creates division and stress. Shared values are the glue that holds communities together, so it's especially painful when loved ones choose a path that takes them away from You. What's our role when others veer?

ear child, I'm so sorry for the hurt you're feeling, and I appreciate your concern over the spiritual well-being of those you love. But your Father made each one of you with free will for a beautiful rea-

son: He wants each one of you to come to Him in pure love and genuine affection. He does not require any performance on your part nor does He twist your arm. He wants all hearts but only those that are freely given.

"My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me...and they shall never perish."

—Jesus to the crowd, John 10:27–28 NKJV

When it comes to the hearts of others, you help by showing them what's in your heart and telling them your love story with Me. Sharing your tenderness toward Me and your joy in Me is a gift you give the world. Such love and joy is often contagious.

Much more than that, however, you must not do. You must not threaten or cajole or bully another into a faith relationship. Those who come to Me in that way do not stay with Me. The less you have—the "poorer" your spirit is—the more open you are to the gifts that the Holy Spirit brings.

you'd know it was playing, you couldn't really hear it, couldn't really lose yourself in it, because you had the first song on mental replay.

or simply ignoring Me altogether. It was not a good state.

Contrast this by reflecting on how you feel when you are kind to others. Your spirit is light and joyful. You feel expansive, like sharing the good feeling you receive from Me. What a blessed state that is!

The good feeling that makes you spread joy and kindness is something your spirit receives from the Holy Spirit. When your spirit is healthy, you bear good fruit in the world. 
"And the glory which You gave Me I have given them, that they may be one just as We are one: I in them, and You in Me."

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


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
